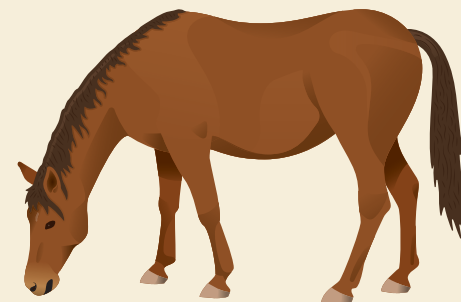


# Recommended Vaccine Schedule FOR Adult Horses

Based on American Association of Equine Practitioners (AAEP) Vaccination Guidelines<sup>1</sup>

Adult horses require protection from the potentially fatal core diseases through annual vaccination and should also receive risk-based vaccinations to protect them from common diseases they may encounter depending on your geographic location, travel plans, and amount of horse to horse socialization.



## CORE VACCINATIONS:

Protection from diseases that are endemic to a region, those with potential public health significance, required by law, highly infectious, or pose a risk of severe disease and death.

Tetanus	CORE EQ INNOVATOR®	Annual revaccination: Recommended in spring

## RISK-BASED VACCINATIONS:

Protection from diseases which your horse may be more likely to encounter depending on where you live, your travel plans, and amount of socialization selected for use based on risk assessment performed by, or in consultation with, a licensed veterinarian.

Equine Influenza (EIV)	FLUVAC INNOVATOR®	Annual revaccination: Recommended in spring
Equine Herpesvirus (EHV-1 and EHV-4)	EHV-4/1	Horses at increased risk of exposure may receive booster every 6 months
Leptospirosis	LEPTO EQ INNOVATOR®	Annual revaccination based on risk
Strangles	PINNACLE® I.N.	Annual revaccination based on risk
<i>Streptococcus equi</i>		
Equine Arteritis Virus (EAV)	ARVAC®	Breeding stallions previously vaccinated against EAV: Annual booster every 12 months and not less than 3 to 4 weeks prior to breeding  Breeding stallions, unvaccinated or having unknown vaccine history: All first-time vaccinated stallions should be isolated for 3 weeks following vaccination before being used for breeding.  Teaser stallions: Vaccination against EAV is recommended on an annual basis

Consult your veterinarian to develop a vaccination program to protect your foal.
